EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

The Hunterdon County Division of Emergency Management has seen an increase in emergency responses over the past year. The division continues to provide emergency management functions of emergency planning, preparedness, response and recovery as well as the additional responsibilities of homeland security grants management, the Hunterdon County Emergency Services Training Center, NIMS integration, and the new EOC construction. Additional projects that were completed over the past year include the distribution of GPS units for every fire truck and ambulance in the County, development of 2 class B foam trailers, and the purchase of 2 light-tower trailers.

County Coordinator & Deputy Coordinator: 48 Responses.(20/workday; 28/after hours; 35 meet/events after hours)

Bureau of Fire / Fire Coordinators: 52 responses, 37 meetings, 1009 volunteer man hours.

Bureau of EMS / EMS Coordinators: 11 responses, 20 meetings,

Emergency Services Training Center: 2884 certificates issued; 168 courses held.

Hazardous Materials Response Team: 15 responses, 12 meetings, 12 drills.

Mobile Command Post: 1 emergency response; 14 non-emergency response/stand-bys

YOUTH

In 2008 the Youth Facility provided 82 children with shelter services, an increase over last year. Of the children referred 36 were from DYFS, 23 were from Court/Probation, and 23 were referred by the Family Crisis Intervention Unit. The children spent a total of 2,344 days in shelter. The staff and children at the shelter prepared over seven thousand meals. While in shelter the children spent 75 hours volunteering. This included helping the Friends of the Library with their book drive, helping the United Way, Lebanon Township clean-up day, Milford SPCA, the Health Department and helping the Interfaith Hospitality Network. Upon discharge, 6 children went to detention, fifteen went to other programs (such as group homes, diagnostic centers, hospitals), thirty-three went home, ten went into foster care, eight went to live with relatives, and ten went to residential rehab for alcohol and drugs. Shelter services include case management, medical appointments including eyeglass and dental care, linkage to community agencies, transportation to court, counseling, and educational/recreational activities.
